that marks the end of Ramadan. Did you know it is celebrated for one to three days depending on the country you're from?


This year, Ramadan started on the 22nd of March and continued for 30 days. This can change depending on the cycles of the moon as this is also what the Islamic calendar is based on.

The King's Coronation

Since the passing of Queen Elizabeth II, back in Sept 2022, her son, Charles, had become



King but had been awaiting his Coronation day.

A coronation is a celebratory event where the Sovereign is crowned and presented with numerous ceremonial objects including the Crown Jewels, the Orb and Sceptre.

The King's coronation took place recently on Saturday 6th

May 2023, at Westminster Abbey (London). The ceremony saw his Majesty King Charles III crowned alongside Camilla - Queen consort! The coronation reflected on the monarch's role today and looked towards the future whilst being steeped in longstanding traditions and richness.

Over 2000 people received special invites to the coronation, including workers of the NHS and fundraisers!! This was significantly less than the number of guests at Queen Elizabeth's coronation back in 1953.



King Charles III had a coronation emblem and the Investiture took place in a 700 year old chair! The crown has been around since 1661 when our first King was crowned.

Many street parties were held across the country to celebrate such an event. Many played games, decorated buildings and shared memories from the past with each other. I wonder how long it will be until we crown the next King - William.

For the last few weeks we have been learning about the King and his Coronation. The children have been listening to Coronation music, learning new songs, drawing portraits, making crowns, watching Newsround and writing fact files about the King. This Friday, we will be having our class celebrations across the school. Next week, the Juniors will be taking part in Coronation dance workshops called Dancing through the Decades.
