

After a fantastic Autumn term, we have started the Spring term strong. Our first day back focused on 'Just Talk'. Every class took the time to engage in a variety of activities that allowed them to focus on their language and communication skills. Reception started the day sharing their holiday news with each other. Year 1 strengthened their communication skills by doing maths challenges in teams. Year 4 watched a video of 'Martin's Big Words' by Martin Luther King Jr. It tells the story of how the positive words he heard from his father and from the Bible and the negative words he heard inspired him to stand up for justice and civil rights. The children talked about the impact of 'Martin's Big Words' and how it inspired them to think about their own 'Big Words' that will drive them to achieve big things throughout the year. Year 6 spent time talking about anti-bullying and how they feel we can combat bullying.
