This week we would like to give a big shout out to Stevenage Community Trust. The trust awards grants to organisations and individuals across Stevenage and the surrounding villages.

This year the school has benefited from 2 grants awarded by the trust.

In February they awarded us £750 to go towards the cost of a new trim trail/climbing frame in the Early Years Playground. This equipment is helping the children to develop their gross motor skills, including their upper body strength and general physical skills. These are hugely important skills which then have an impact on children's fine motor skills.

Then in May they awarded us £1,500 from their Covid-19 recovery fund which they created to help schools support students affected by the pandemic. This funding will be used to purchase reading books throughout the school to provide the best opportunities for our children to catch up in reading.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank everybody at Stevenage Community Trust for their continued support to both our school and the local community.

Ellie was adept at identifying main clauses and subordinate clauses within a selection of sentences taken from the book currently being studied in Year 6. She was then able to take different scenes from the book and write a range of sentences, constructed in different ways, and where appropriate, considered the comparable effectiveness of each. Ellie (and other children in Shakespeare class) will then seek to further develop the skill of crafting sentences in a variety of ways through the writing of diary entries in the 1st person. Writing up scientific investigations is a very different text type (compared to diary writing) and Ellie showed she was just as capable of constructing a clear, concise piece that was full of technical vocabulary.

With our minds all on football and England's kick off in the Euros on Sunday, the FA have been working hard to promote mental health awareness and reducing the stigma, prejudice and discrimination that can be associated with mental health conditions both in sport and wider society. Before half term, Year 1 was learning all about the Jewish celebration, Shabbat in their RE lessons. Geography



As part of the school's new Junior DofE Award, Year 5 took their children out to complete a simple orienteering course around the school. Children were provided with a map of the school, which they had to read and match to their physical location so that they could find the clues around the school.



In year 6, we have been looking at climate change on a global scale. The children have been researching how other countries are working to reduce their waste through schemes such as recycling and alternative disposal methods. Hayden and Darci looked at the different rates of recycling in a range of countries, and found that in Mexico their recycling rate is 3.3% while in South Korea their recycling rate is much healthier at 49%.



HOLIDAYS

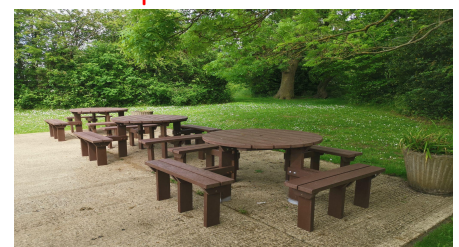

BREAKFAST CLUB

- Breakfast Club runs from 7.30am to 8:45 am and includes breakfast.
- Breakfast club costs £3.50 per child per day.
- Children must be signed into the club by whoever is bringing them to school.
- Children should not be dropped at the gate and sent into the club on their own. Breakfast on offer includes such choices as: cereal, toast, croissants, fruit, and fruit juices.

AFTER SCHOOL CLUB

- After School Club runs from 3.15 to 6.00 pm in two sessions:
- 3.15 - 5:00pm Session A £7.00 per day per child
- 3.15 - 6.00 pm Session B £8.50 per day per child
- A snack such as sandwiches, wraps, cheese, biscuits, and fruits are served to all children attending the after-school club.

Planned activities available may include:

- Creative art and crafts activities - painting, drawing, cutting, sticking and model making.
- Free play - activities chosen by your child.
- Imaginative play - dressing up and role play.
- Messy play - sand water clay and dough
- Outside play - depending on weather.
- Sports activities - organised by our PE staff.
