I was minding my own business, walking to school along a gentle stream, when a horrible noise filled my ears. I was appalled to see a young, alarmed boy running from a Nazi truck (which seemed to be broken down) and two soldiers pointing rifles at him. He raised his shaking hands in the air, palms upwards, in an act of surrender, yet you still grabbed him by the scruff of his neck and chucked him in the back of the van.

What could such an unoffensive boy have done to deserve such dreadful treatment? Is this what our proud soldiers signed up to? Pointing guns at fearful young children? They should be ashamed.

Imagine my surprise when I saw you, our usually affectionate and friendly mayor, gripping the boy and throwing him into the back of the Nazi truck.

#### BREAKFAST CLUB

- Breakfast Club runs from 7.30am to 8:45 am and includes breakfast.
- Breakfast club costs £3.50 per child per day.
- Children must be signed into the club by whoever is bringing them to school.
- Children should not be dropped at the gate and sent into the club on their own. Breakfast on offer includes such choices as: cereal, toast, croissants, fruit, and fruit juices.

#### AFTER SCHOOL CLUB

- After School Club runs from 3.15 to 6.00 pm in two sessions:
- 3.15 5:00pm Session A £7.00 per day per child
- 3.15 6.00 pm Session B £8.50 per day per child
- A snack such as sandwiches, wraps, cheese, biscuits, and fruits are served to all children attending the after-school club.

The County Council is responsible for setting a published admission number (PAN) for all community and voluntarycontrolled schools and must consult on any proposals to reduce PANs. After a period of demographic growth, the demand for primary places across the county has fallen and, in some areas, fewer school places are needed. This is in line with a decrease in primary demand across most other local authorities. Changes in demand are not evenly distributed and some areas and schools are impacted more than others. As part of the PAN setting process for academic year 2023/24, the County Council has engaged with headteachers and governing bodies at a number of schools, including The Leys Primary and Nursery School, to discuss and agree a proposed PAN reduction.

A reduction of the PAN at The Leys Primary and Nursery School from 75 to 60 places from 2023/24 is proposed following a drop in the number of applications and allocations for September 2021. The pupil forecast indicates lower demand for Reception places across this part of Stevenage for 2023/4 and beyond. A reduction in PAN would create a better match of places to expected demand, protecting the financial viability of the school moving forward. The Governing Body and Headteacher are both in agreement with the proposal which will assist the school both organisationally and financially.
